OUABC Training in Covid Times

Club President, Jo Heymann writes:

Hopes of eased restrictions regarding sport were dashed with the announcement of Lockdown 3.0 at the start of January. We had managed to obtain 'Return to Play' status from Sports Fed for the start of the Christmas vacation and were able to run one in-person session before Iffley Sports Centre closed for the Christmas period for those remaining in Oxford.

0th week Hilary term saw the return of virtual training run by the OUABC captains. Six sessions were run each week consisting of circuits, Tabata and conditioning along with some basic technique sessions aimed at new joiners. This dropped to three sessions in the last few weeks of term to streamline attendance. This term also saw the creation of this year's OUABC Strava account and keen new boxers have been ramping up the running miles. The initiative of "Boxing families", where new boxers are allocated senior boxing "parents" to help them get to know the club and other members and get advice on training, has also been a hit. This scheme, along with the weekly random pairings (or "Don't Chat In Our Gym" (DCOG) as it was affectionately named) that enabled boxers to meet up with a different member each week, was implemented early on in Michaelmas Term.

Uni life is rather different from the norm, with each college implementing their own set of rules. Many colleges only allowed a few people to return this term, giving Oxford a rather emptier feel. However, Uni Parks, Christ Church Meadow and South Parks have been full of students on social walks in pairs and an ever increasing number of runners. Another innovative "gym-like" activity has emerged in the form of gymnastics rings, which, formerly first seen early in Michaelmas, has bloomed in popularity. The end of Hilary Term saw the first few socially-distanced college formals occurring and more colleges have made plans to bring them back going into Trinity Term, in an exciting return of Oxford traditions.

We have come to the difficult decision not to plan a Varsity match this summer due to continuing uncertainties about a return to full contact training and the availability of athletes outside of term time. However, we expect Varsity 2022 to go ahead as usual with Oxford hosting in the Town Hall.

Indoor training is currently expected to return in May with outdoor training, likely resembling that from the start of this academic year, beginning in 0th week of Trinity. Despite a sparse year of boxing as we know it, we have some dedicated new members and expect to field a strong team in the coming academic year.

Peter Coughlin 1934-2014

The description “unsung hero” is overused but, in the context of Peter Coughlin’s contribution to OUABC, it seems apt.

Peter was born in Poplar, East London in 1934 and evacuated to Oxford during the Second World War. East London’s loss was Oxford’s gain, with Peter volunteering as assistant coach and corner second at the boxing club from 1979 to 2004 and working with head coaches including Alf Gallie, Percy Lewis, David Holmes and Henry Dean. Henry once said that the success he had during his tenure as head coach simply wouldn’t have been possible without Peter.

For any of us who boxed during that period, Peter was the voice of calm authority and reassurance. He quietly took boxers on the pads, uttered words of encouragement and made wry observations, whilst the head coach oversaw sparring. Outside the gym he always wore his trademark flat cap and had a cigarette hanging out the corner of his mouth. His sister, Tess, recalls the old Sunday morning training runs in Headington Hill Park, where Peter would shout at boxers to get a move on, from the top of the hill whilst puffing on his cigarette. One of the trio of Duggan brothers who won boxing blues remembers complaining to Peter of shin splints, to which he shook his head and responded “What you need is more road work.” Always a great motivator.

As a boy in Oxford, Peter attended the Salesian College in Cowley and qualified as a technical engineer. After leaving he worked at the university’s Department of Experimental Psychology, which some might suggest was perfect preparation for his role as assistant coach. However, Peter’s love of boxing started as a schoolboy when he boxed for Salesian Boys, competing in annual tournaments against other clubs, ironically held every March at Oxford Town Hall.


Everyone has a story about Peter, but a couple spring to mind. Once, when working the corner as second to Percy, Percy removed the mouth guard of a boxer who then took a mouthful of water. When it came to spitting it out, in the excitement Peter thrust the bucket to the wrong side and, depending on whose version of events you believe, the mouthful ended up on Peter, a judge or a ringside spectator in black tie.



On another occasion, in 1986, Peter enjoyed the post-Varsity Match dinner a tad too much. This resulted in members of the team calling Mrs Coughlin from a phone box (remember those) explaining his predicament, telling her where he was and that he needed picking up. Somewhat fearful of her reputation, the guys did the only reasonable thing and left him propped up in the phone box waiting for his lift.

I boxed from 1984 to 1986, before going abroad as part of my degree. During that year Percy Lewis stood down as head coach, to be replaced by David Holmes, and when I returned as captain for the 1987/8 year I was delighted to see Peter's familiar face still in the gym and as second in the corner, providing important continuity. He was a modest man and certainly not in it for himself - like so many of the coaches we all benefitted from working with, he did it because of a love of boxing and wanting to give people like us a helping hand. I will always be grateful to him for that.

I know he was incredibly proud of his involvement in the club and of our achievements. He had all his team photos up on his walls and his daughter, Sarah Murfin, has kindly donated them to the club so those originals will be part of the display to be erected outside the GLD at Iffley Road. Peter passed away a matter of days before his 80th birthday, he was buried in his blazer and OUABC tie. That ought to bring a lump to your throat...

We owe a huge debt of thanks to Peter Davies [PWD] who has been editing the newsletter since the start of 2018 but who has decided to hang up his pen. From his own initiative Peter Ho started the newsletter way back, and in his time Peter Davies has expanded it to make it much more substantial. He has done a tremendous job, including many varied articles from both current Club news and events to stories, anecdotes, and articles about the Club from the past, all written with his particular brand of humour, which I for one have very much enjoyed. Peter continues to be a terrific supporter of the Club, always willing to give help, time, and advice when asked. He also helped Charles Masraff organise the fantastic 'Nairac Lunch.' If all that wasn't enough he has, like many of you, a generous standing order to the Club and never fails to respond to requests for sponsorship of events/bouts etc. Buy him a drink when you next see him, he deserves it!

PWD writes: "It has been a privilege to be involved with OUABC again, especially to meet old friends and make new ones. I finally persuaded my Managing Director to move from Worcestershire to Northumberland {and there is still snow on the Cheviots in April, which is something of a shock} and as the new house was operating as a B&B having formerly been the village police station and court house, and is complete with cells; there is a lot of work to be done.
